182,314 Adult Services provided in 2021.




SOCIAL EQUITY

“EQUITY, DIVERSITY AND INCLUSION IS A PRIORITY FOR THE STATE OF COLORADO”

- ▶ The Marijuana Enforcement Division is committed to fostering an inclusive and equitable cannabis industry in Colorado that acknowledges the effects of decades of criminal enforcement of marijuana laws on communities of color. As part of Colorado's commitment to equity, diversity, and inclusion, the MED is focusing on outreach and engagement resources to support diversity initiatives in the cannabis industry. The MED's efforts aim to increase diversity in the number of Owner Licenses, which have less diverse representation in comparison to the number of Employee Licensees, so the industry is more reflective of Colorado's demographics.
- ▶ A person who meets the eligibility criteria for a Social Equity Licensee can participate in the divisions “Accelerator Program” or may apply to independently own and operate a Regulated Marijuana Business license.
- ▶ Fitting the criteria, and becoming a Social Equity Licensee, we feel being able to utilize the program to open the first Consumption Lounge in Pueblo, where people can consume cannabis safely, with guidance, is the most logical next step.

RESPONSIBILITY

The future of consumption lounges for cannabis use is promising in several areas

- ▶ For the responsible adult-use of cannabis, as the industry continues to thrive and expand, the need for licensed social consumption lounges becomes greater.
 - ▶ Regulated spaces are crucial for many medical patients, who may live in government-funded housing that ban federally illegal drugs, assisted living facilities, and apartment complexes where use is also banned.
 - ▶ For non-Colorado residents, the consumer visits our state, purchases cannabis legally, but has the dilemma of finding somewhere to consume legally. There are few if any cannabis friendly hotels in the area, public use is illegal, understandably so.
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RESPONSIBILITY

The future of consumption lounges for cannabis use is promising in several areas

- ▶ Consumption lounges will encourage people to purchase products from licensed dispensaries for enjoyment in sanctioned venues, as opposed to buying from unlicensed dealers and consuming in clandestine places like parks or parking lots.
 - ▶ *This is especially helpful in cities where tourists, who may be staying in smoke-free hotels, are prominent cannabis customers.*
- ▶ Social lounges are poised to be another cannabis tourism attraction and, as a result, revenue stream for their respective municipalities.
- ▶ Social consumption lounges welcome visitors and locals alike into safe, protected hubs to enjoy both new and familiar products while creating relationships with others.

RESPONSIBILITY

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- ▶ Social consumption lounges have the potential to be the safest places to consume and learn about dosing. CBD heavy products will be available for consumers who encounter negative effects from THC, as CBD has been proven to counteract those negative effects of THC.
 - ▶ For instance, dispensaries in Oakland California, adapted the California Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control's intoxication guidelines, so budtenders know when to cut off service. The department also provides operating procedures to manage any medical emergencies that may occur.
- ▶ Social consumption lounges will generate much needed tax dollars for the City of Pueblo, which will benefit the community immensely.
- ▶ In 2018, Colorado passed SB18-211. "Marijuana Consumption Club License" concerning licensing marijuana consumption lounges.

RESPONSIBILITY

SB18-211 - MARIJUANA CONSUMPTION CLUB LICENSE

BILL SUMMARY

- ▶ The bill creates a marijuana consumption club (club) license. The license is subject to the same licensing requirements as other retail marijuana licenses. The license may be issued to a person who operates an establishment where retail marijuana or retail marijuana products may be sold and consumed. The club's sales are limited to the same limits as a retail marijuana store. The club may not serve food prepared on site or alcohol. Entry to the club is restricted to those persons at least 21 years of age. A club shall purchase its retail marijuana or retail marijuana products from a licensed marijuana business or get a cultivation license and sell its own marijuana. A club may not permit outside marijuana or marijuana products. All retail marijuana or retail marijuana products must be consumed or disposed of on site. A club and its employees shall successfully complete a responsible vendor program annually. A club has the same immunity to a lawsuit for an injury caused by a club patron that a bar enjoys.
- ▶ The bill allows a local government to permit clubs in its jurisdiction. If a local government permits clubs, it shall adopt an approval or licensing requirement. In order to operate as a club, the club must comply with the local and state licensing regulations. A club is exempt from the 'Colorado Clean Indoor Air Act' for marijuana consumption purposes if it is fully ventilated. Public display, consumption, or use of marijuana in a club is not a criminal offense.

RESPONSIBILITY

The future of consumption lounges for cannabis use is promising in several areas

Cannabis related traffic citations have only increased from 2014-2020 as shown below. This number is sure to decrease with Cannabis Consumption Lounge availability.
