

## **ADVISEMENT OF YOUR RIGHT TO EXPUNGEMENT OF JUVENILE CRIMINAL RECORDS**

You may have the records in any criminal case expunged free of charge by order of this Court if you were a juvenile at the time of the commission of the alleged offenses in this case, and

- your case is dismissed or
- you fully comply with your sentence and pay all outstanding restitution, fines, and fees, and
- you have no pending felony, misdemeanor, petty offense or delinquency actions.

**TRAFFIC CASES AND CASES FOR VIOLATION OF P.M.C. §11-1-203 (INDECENT EXPOSURE) ARE NOT ELIGIBLE FOR EXPUNGMENT.**

Expunging your records means that:

- You may lawfully assert that you have no juvenile delinquency record related to this case and that these records do not exist.
- You may lawfully deny ever being arrested, charged, convicted or sentenced in the expunged matter.

If the Prosecutor does not object to the expungement, the Court will automatically expunge your records 42 days after either a dismissal or full compliance with your sentence. Should the Prosecutor object, the Court will set the case for a hearing and the Court will decide if your records should be expunged.

If the Court orders your records expunged, the Court will send a copy of the Order to

- You, the juvenile defendant,
- Your attorney (if any),
- The Prosecuting Attorney, and
- The Pueblo Police Department or any other local law enforcement agency whose officer issued the citation.

**You may provide a copy of the Order of Expungement to any entity you wish; however, the Court will only send the a copy of the Order of Expungement to those agencies listed above, unless, within fourteen (14) of the Order of Expungement, you provide a list of the other agencies to whom you wish the Court to send its Expungement Order.**
