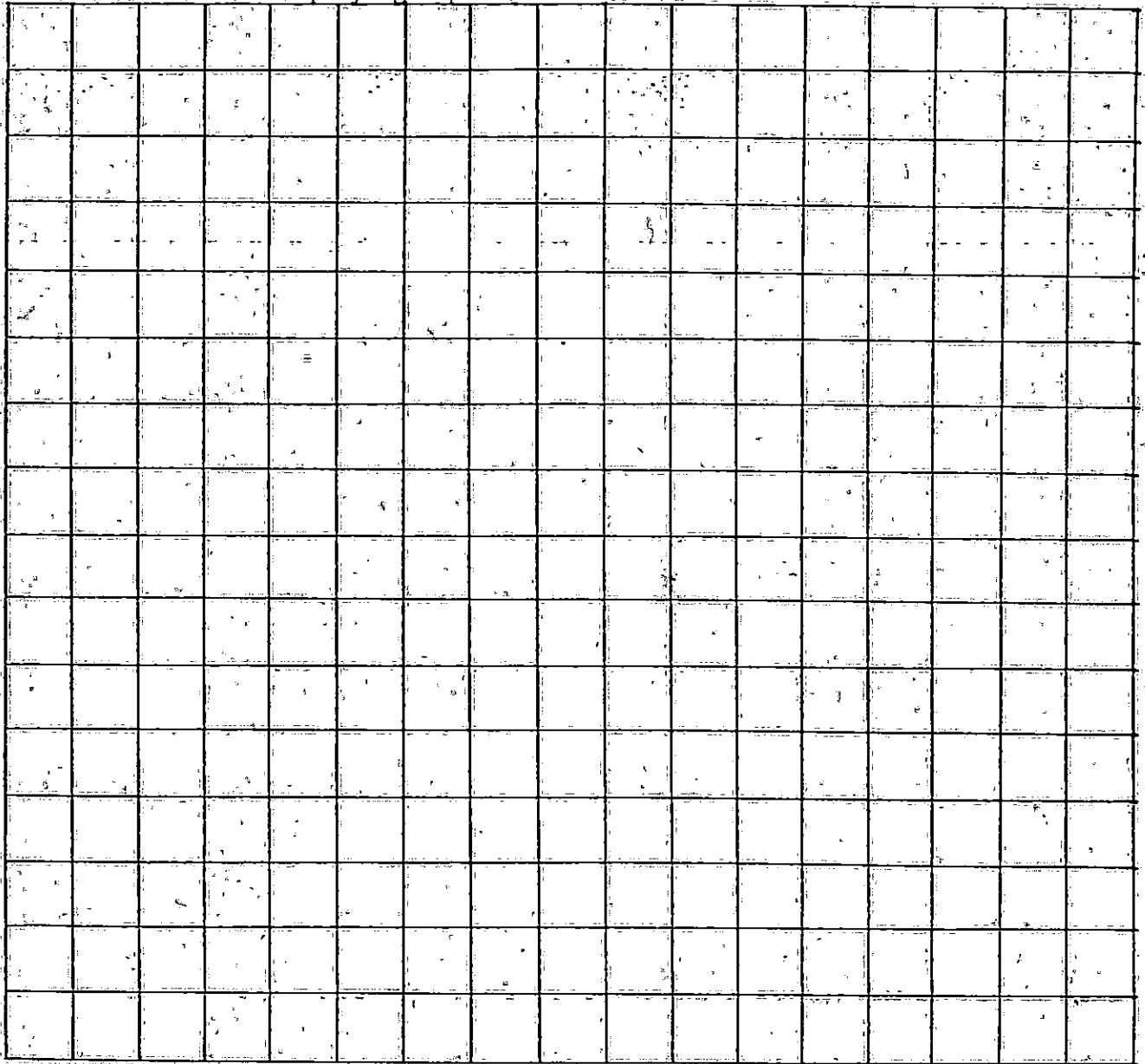

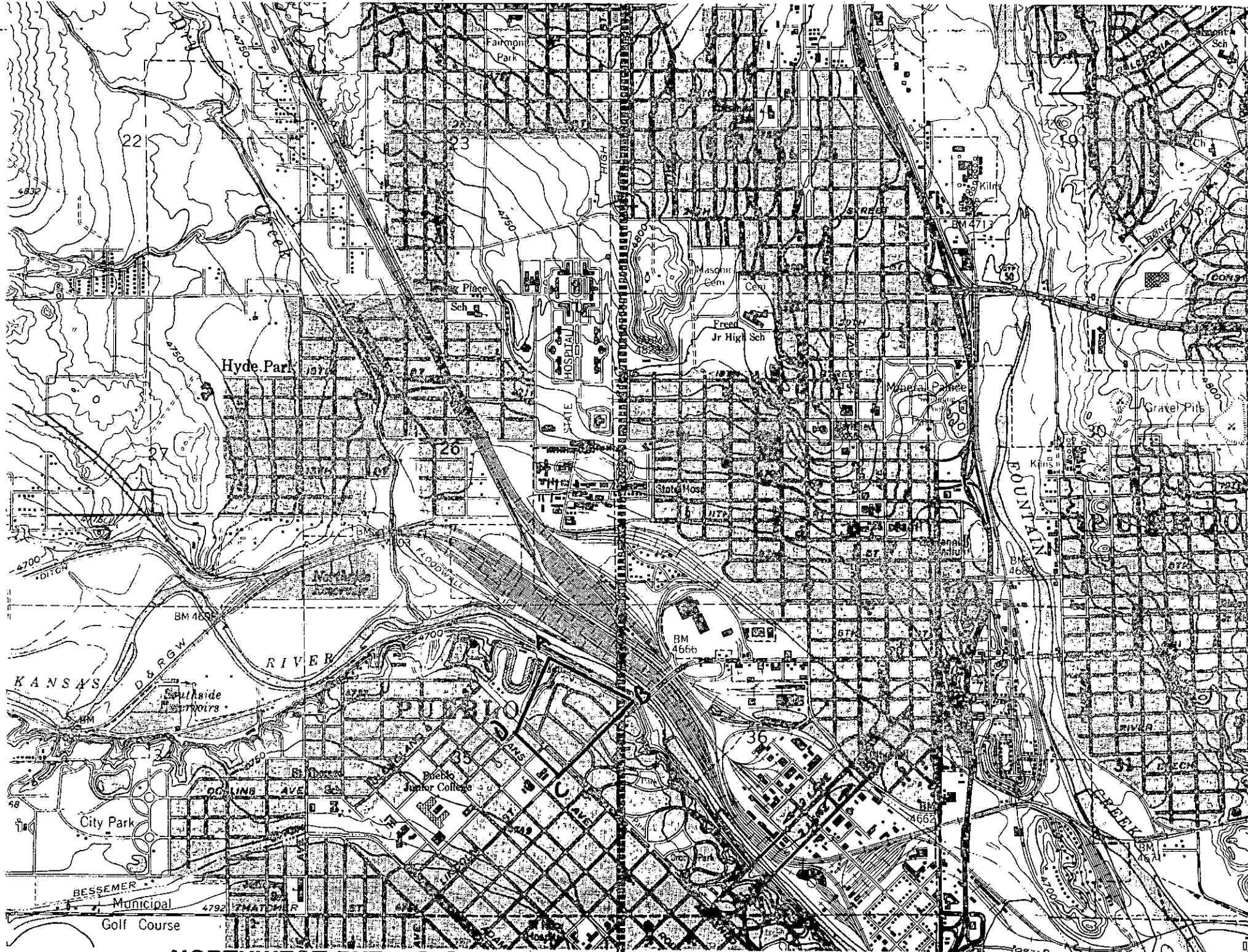

## CARLILE PLACE--RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT

The Carlile District includes an area generally bounded by 4th Street on the southeast, the alley between West Abriendo and West Routt on the southwest, Boulder Street (District 60 Stadium) on the northwest, and the Arkansas River on the northeast. The District is within the Carlile's Resubdivision of the original Corona Park Subdivision. Carlile's Resubdivision was recorded in 1889. The street, Carlile Place, is named after the Carlile family whose family home is at the northeast terminus of Carlile Place. The Carlile family is an important family in early Pueblo history. Another prominent structure on Carlile Place is the Nuckolls family home. The Carlile District boundaries include both the development along Carlile Place and the development between Carlile Place and West 4th Street. Carlile Place is dominated by large two-story structures. The prominent design is Victorian. The development between Carlile Place and West 4th Street is smaller in scale, and very similar to the development in the West Corona District. Before the extension of 4th Street through Corona Park to Lincoln Avenue, this area and the West Corona area would have appeared as one district. This area was first mapped by the Sanborn Map Company in 1905.
